Dear Secretaries Vilsack and Haaland:

The Federal Subsistence Board (Board) has received a letter from the Southeast Alaska Subsistence Regional Advisory Council (Council). This letter is in support of the efforts made by Salmon Beyond Borders (SBB) to bring attention to transboundary mining and its possible negative impacts to subsistence resources. SBB presented information to the Council in October 2022 and requested the Council's support in elevating the concerns to both Secretaries of Agriculture and Interior and asked that specific actions be taken. The Council voted to send the attached letter in a further effort to highlight this issue and encourage action to protect the health of fisheries in these rivers.

This Council has been following the Canadian mining industry within the transboundary watersheds, which include the Taku, Stikine, and Unuk rivers in Southeast Alaska for several years. The Council has previously written letters to the Alaska Lieutenant Governor and requested that steps be taken to protect waters throughout the transboundary river watersheds that originate in British Columbia and flow into Southeast Alaska. The Council specifically asked the Lt. Governor to send a letter to the Secretary of State requesting Federal engagement in this issue regarding the large-scale mining operations that are currently running or are planned for transboundary river watersheds in Southeast Alaska. In addition, the Council requested an International Joint Commission referral to further safeguard water quality and fishery production in these rivers. To date, the Council has received no response.

The Council is continuing their advocacy by supporting similar efforts by SBB to draw attention to the risk posed by these mines, as outlined in the attached letter. The Council would like to see the requested actions in this letter be taken so that threats by Canadian upriver mining operations on Southeast Alaska subsistence resources can be eliminated, or at least mitigated. Upon review and consideration, the Council would appreciate the courtesy of your reply, which, it hopes, will outline the specific actions you will take in response to these requests.
