YUKON AREA SALMON FISHERY CLOSURE IN COASTAL DISTRICT, DISTRICT 1 & DISTRICT 2

TEMPORARY SPECIAL ACTION

Under Authority of: 36 CFR 242.10 and .19
50 CFR 100.10 and .19

Issued at: Fairbanks, Alaska, May 27, 2025

Effective Date: Sunday, June 1, 2025, 8:00 p.m. for Coastal District and District 1
Tuesday, June 3, 2025, 8:00 p.m. for District 2
Expiration Date: Wednesday, December 31, 2025, 8:00 a.m. unless superseded by subsequent special action

EXPLANATION:

This Temporary Special Action closes the Federal public waters between the latitude of Point Romanof and the latitude of the westernmost point of the Naskonat Peninsula including those waters draining into the Bering Sea (the Coastal District), and Federal waters of Yukon districts Y-1 and Y-2 to the subsistence harvest and retention of Chinook and summer chum salmon. This closure prohibits all directed subsistence fishing for Chinook and summer chum salmon and closes Federal public waters in these districts to gear larger than 4-inch stretched mesh and longer than 60 feet. If salmon are caught while fishing for nonsalmon, they should be released alive but may be legally retained if dead. The use of fish wheels is not allowed during these closures.

REGULATION:

Subsistence fishing is currently open 24 hours a day, seven days per week with 7.5-inch or smaller mesh gillnets.

50 CFR 100.27(e)(3) Subsistence taking of fish—Yukon-Northern Area is amended to read:

(ii) **In Federal public waters of the following areas:**

Coastal District and District 1 from the Naskonat Peninsula north to Point Romanof, which includes the Black River and the communities of Chevak, Hooper Bay, Scammon Bay, Emmonak, Nunam Iqua, Alakanuk, and Kotlik:

Effective 8 p.m. Sunday, June 1, Chinook and summer chum salmon fishing is closed. Gillnets larger than 4-inch are not allowed. Gillnets of 4-inch or smaller mesh may be used to target nonsalmon and are restricted to 60-feet or less in length and must be operated as a set net near shore.

District 2, which includes Mountain Village, Pitka's Point, St. Mary's, Pilot Station, and Marshall:

Effective 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 3, Chinook and summer chum salmon fishing is closed. Gillnets larger than 4-inch are not allowed. Gillnets of 4-inch or smaller mesh may be used to target nonsalmon and are restricted to 60-feet or less in length and must be operated as a set net near shore.

Dip nets, beach seines, and hook and line gear may be used for nonsalmon and pink and sockeye salmon; however, Chinook and summer chum salmon must be released alive.

If you are catching Chinook or summer chum salmon in a 4-inch gillnet, please move it to avoid catching these species. Later in the season, the use of 4-inch gillnets will be closed between the first and third quarter points, in order to reduce any incidental catch of Canadian-origin Chinook salmon.

JUSTIFICATION:

The drainage-wide Chinook salmon outlook is for a run size of about 72,000 fish, and the Canadian-origin Chinook salmon outlook is about 30,000 fish. Escapement goals are unlikely to be met for Chinook salmon and closures will likely be required for the duration of their migration. The summer chum salmon outlook is for a run size of 1.1 million fish. While the drainage-wide escapement goal of 500,000–1.2 million summer chum salmon could be met, closures are warranted until run projections indicate goals will be met and a surplus is available for subsistence harvest. Pursuant to Section 816 of ANILCA, this Temporary Special Action (**2-KS-01-25**) closes fishing for Chinook and summer chum salmon in the Federal public waters of the Yukon River coastal area and Yukon River drainage due to concerns about the viability of these populations. Large mesh gillnet closures are likely throughout the summer season to avoid incidental harvest of Chinook salmon. Salmon fishing closures in the lower river are issued based on the historical timing of Chinook salmon arrival in the area. These closures will be implemented up river based on fish migration timing.

CONSULTATION AND OUTREACH:

The Yukon River salmon outlooks and management strategies were discussed at a public hearing; the Eastern Interior, Western Interior, and Yukon Kuskokwim Delta Regional Advisory Council meetings; the Yukon River Drainage Fisheries Association (YRDFA) annual Preseason Fisheries Meeting; at the Yukon River Panel and at the Yukon River Intertribal Fish commission meeting. The Federal manager offered formal Government-to-Government Tribal Consultation meetings with Yukon River drainage Tribal Governments upon request. The Federal fishery outlook and management strategy was sent to all Yukon Tribal and City governments on May 23. Approximately 3,500 copies of the ADF&G and USFWS Preseason Outlook flier were mailed to Yukon River fishing households in May.

This action was taken following coordination with the ADF&G fishery managers. The fishing schedules announced here match those issued concurrently by the ADF&G in state waters (Summer Fishery Advisory Announcement #2). The Federal Subsistence Regional Advisory Council Chairs for the Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta, Eastern Interior, Western Interior, and Seward Peninsula Regional Advisory Councils were notified as was the Chair and vice-chair of the Yukon River Intertribal Fish Commission. Review was provided by the Office of Subsistence Management.

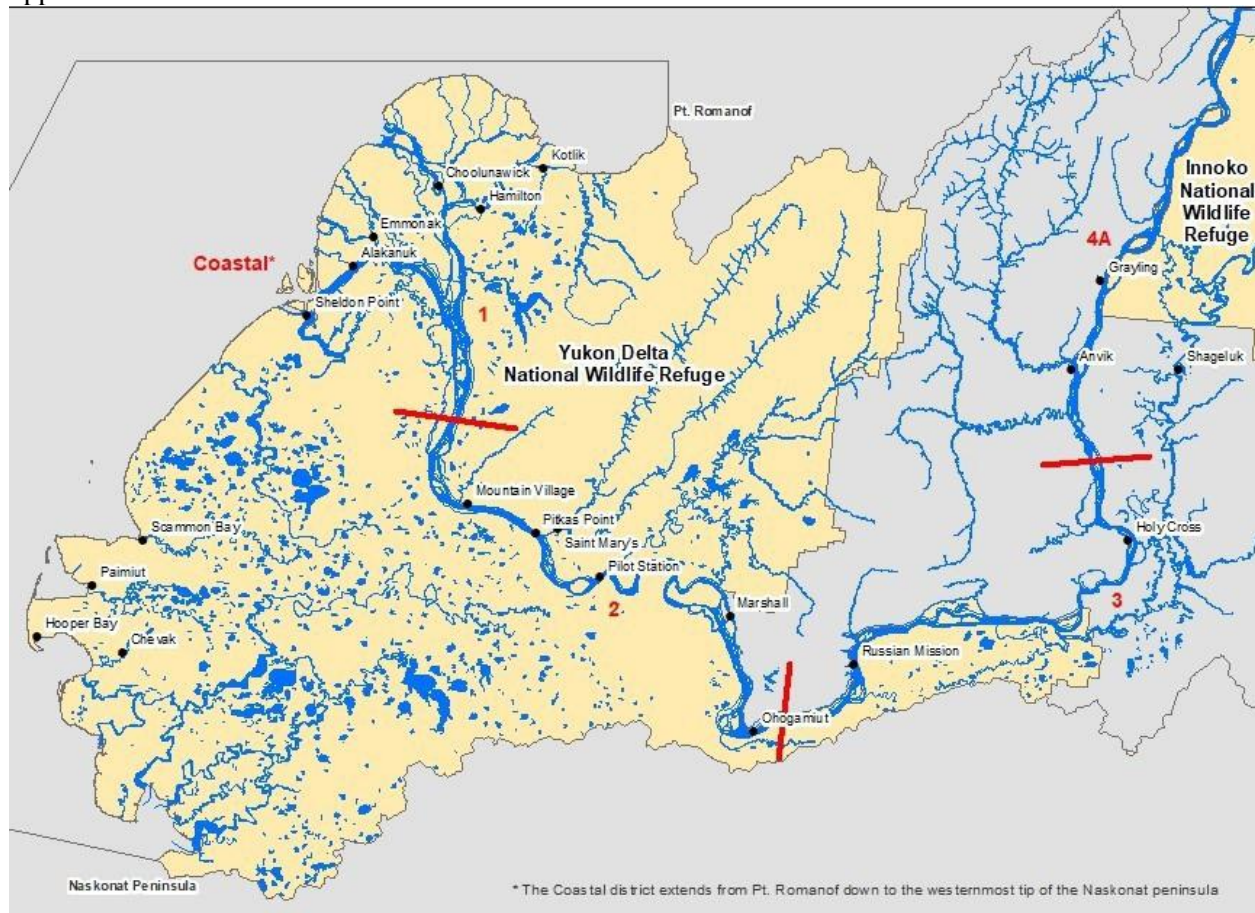

Communities and streams adjacent to the boundary of Federal lands are part of Federal waters, even on the opposite side of the river.



In the Coastal area: Hooper Bay, Chevak and Scammon Bay communities are in Federal waters. However, bays and coastal marine waters are State-managed. In District 2, all communities are in Federal waters. In District 3, only Russian Mission is in Federal waters. Holy Cross and Shageluk (in the Innoko Drainage) are in State waters.
