YUKON AREA GILLNET CLOSURE IN SUBDISTRICT 5-ABC

EMERGENCY SPECIAL ACTION

Under Authority of: 36 CFR 242.10 and .19
43 CFR 51.10 and .19

Emergency Special Action No: 03-KS-12-26

Issued at: Fairbanks, Alaska, June 25, 2026

Effective Date: Friday, July 3, 2026, 8:00 p.m. for Subdistrict 5-ABC

Expiration Date: Monday, July 20, 2026, 8:00 p.m. for Subdistrict 5-ABC, unless superseded by subsequent special action

EXPLANATION:

This Emergency Special Action closes all gillnets for all users in the Federal public waters in Yukon fishing subdistrict 5-ABC. This action protects the Chinook and summer chum salmon runs. All gillnets must be completely removed from the water. Temporary Special Action **03-KS-06-26**, which previously closed Chinook and summer chum salmon fishing, still allowed use of 4-inch and smaller mesh gillnets to target nonsalmon species. This action removes all gillnets to reduce incidental harvest of salmon during peak passage of Chinook salmon in each area. When this Emergency Special Action expires, fishing for species not closed to harvest may resume with gillnets limited to 4-inch mesh or smaller and 60 feet maximum length, operated as a set net near shore.

During the gillnet closure, fishermen may use selective gear such as, dip nets, beach seines, and hook and line gear for nonsalmon species. If Chinook and summer chum salmon are accidentally caught, they should be released alive.

REGULATION:

Pursuant to **03-KS-06-26**, Chinook and summer chum salmon fishing is currently closed to all users, and gillnets of 4-inch and smaller may be used to target other species.

36 CFR 242.27(e)(3) and 43 CFR 51.27(e)(3) Subsistence taking of fish—Yukon-Northern Area is amended to read:

§ __.27(e)(3)(ii) *In Federal public waters of the following Yukon River Drainage areas:*

Subdistrict 5-ABC:

Effective 8 p.m. Friday, July 3 until 8 p.m. Monday, July 20, gillnet use is closed for all users. All gillnets must be completely removed from the water.

JUSTIFICATION:

The drainage-wide Chinook salmon outlook is for a run size of about 64,000 fish, and the Canadian-origin Chinook salmon outlook is about 27,000 fish. Escapement goals are unlikely to be met for Chinook salmon and closures will be required for the duration of their migration. Pursuant to the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act, this Emergency Special Action (**03-KS-12-26**)

closes all gillnet use in Federal public waters of the Yukon River subdistrict 5-ABC during peak passage of the Chinook salmon run, due to concerns about the viability of the population. These complete gillnet closures will ensure no incidental salmon harvest occurs in lethal gillnets between the first quarter point and third quarter point of the Chinook salmon run. These closures will be implemented upriver based on migration timing.

CONSULTATION AND OUTREACH:

The Yukon River salmon outlooks and management strategies were discussed at a Federal public hearing; the Eastern Interior, Western Interior, and Yukon Kuskokwim Delta Regional Advisory Council meetings; the Yukon River Drainage Fisheries Association preseason meeting; at the Yukon River Panel and at the Yukon River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission annual meeting. The Federal manager offered formal Government-to-Government Tribal Consultation meetings with Yukon River drainage Tribal Governments upon request. The Federal fishery outlook and management strategy was sent to all Yukon Tribal and City governments on April 7. Approximately 3,500 copies of the Preseason Outlook flier were mailed to Yukon River fishing households in May.

This action was taken in coordination with the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) and USFWS fishery managers. The fishing schedules announced here match those issued concurrently by the ADF&G in State waters (**Summer Fishery Advisory Announcement #18**). The Federal Subsistence Regional Advisory Council Chairs for the Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta, Eastern Interior, Western Interior, and Seward Peninsula Regional Advisory Councils were notified as was the Chair and Executive Director of the Yukon River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission. Review was provided by the Office of Subsistence Management.

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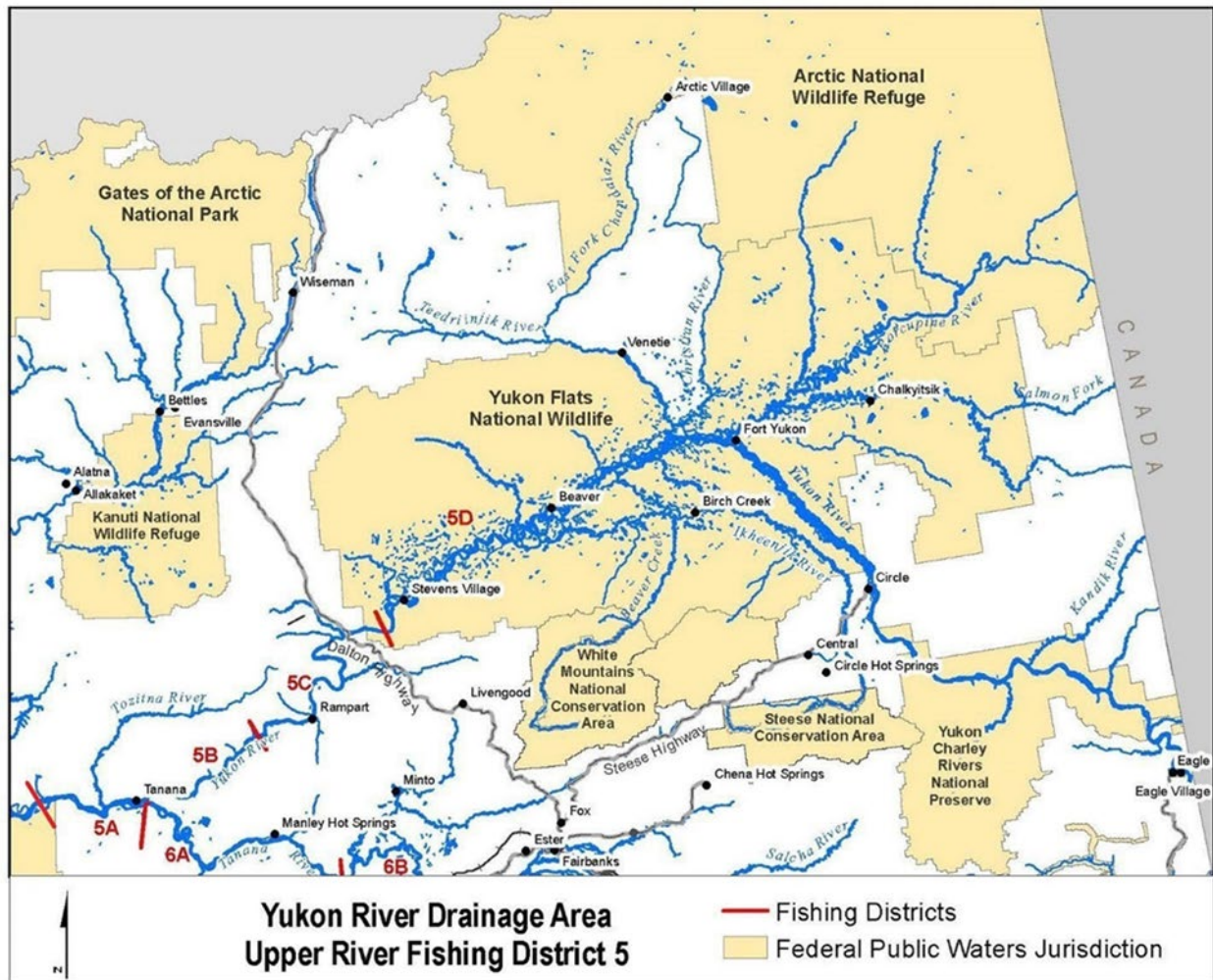


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See below for a detailed area map of federal public waters in the Yukon River Drainage:
