Report of the Department of the Interior Conference Activities and Spending – Fiscal Year 2025

The Department of the Interior (Department or DOI) has implemented internal controls over conference spending and activities in conformance with the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Memorandum M-12-12 *Promoting Efficient Spending to Support Agency Operations*, OMB Memorandum M-17-08 *Amending OMB Memorandum and M-12-12, Promoting Efficient Spending to Support Agency Operations*, and the *Further Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2024, P.L. 118-47*.

Departmental policies provide a framework of internal controls designed to mitigate risks associated with conference planning, hosting and spending, and ensure compliance with Federal travel regulations. These policies require senior management to review and approve Department, Bureau, and Office hosted or attended conference events based on the estimated total conference costs. These efforts have resulted in effective controls over conference activities and spending.

For Fiscal Year 2025, the DOI did not conduct any agency-sponsored conferences with net expenses in excess of \$500,000 which would have required a Secretarial waiver in compliance with OMB Memorandum M-17-08.

Reporting of Conferences held during Fiscal Year 2025 that exceeded \$100,000 in Net Costs

OMB M-17-08 requires, “Agencies shall report on conference expenses on a dedicated place on their official website. By January 31 of each year, the agency shall provide a description of all agency-sponsored conferences from the previous fiscal year where the net expenses for the agency associated with the conference were in excess of \$100,000.”

During Fiscal Year 2025, the DOI conducted four conferences in which expenses exceeded \$100,000. DOI carefully planned each conference to support the DOI mission, the industries it serves, and the American people. A listing of these conferences with pertinent data is provided in the Fiscal Year 2025 Conference Activity table. All agency-hosted conferences were approved by officials with delegated approval authority (per DOI guidance). Conference information and data is based on individual reporting from the relevant Bureaus and Offices.

2025 Tribal Self-Governance Conference	The 2025 Tribal Self-Governance Conference convened Tribal Nations, federal partners, and allies to honor the 50th anniversary of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act and to celebrate the enduring strength of Tribal Self-Governance as a cornerstone of Tribal sovereignty. The conference marked fifty years of progress under the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA)—recognizing the leadership of Tribal Nations and the partnerships that transformed how federal programs are delivered in Indian Country. Through shared learning, the conference highlighted how Tribal Self-Governance has improved outcomes, strengthened Tribal institutions, and reaffirmed the fundamental principle that Tribal Nations are best positioned to govern their own affairs.
