As you are aware, we are in receipt of a disability complaint alleging that the Leon Valley Natural Area Park trails are not accessible to persons with disabilities.

We have accepted this complaint for investigation under Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (Title II). Title II prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in programs and activities conducted by State and local governments.

Title II requires that State and local entities provide a reasonable modification of their programs, services, and activities for individuals with disabilities to be able to participate and receive an equal opportunity to obtain the same result, to gain the same benefit, or to reach the same level of achievement as that provided to others. The program and service that the complainant desires is an equal opportunity to be able to access an accessible trail.

Per your phone conversation with David Quirino of my staff, you indicated that the project of making the trails accessible to people with disabilities has been cancelled. Also, you mentioned that members of the public may use these primitive trails at their own risk.

Please provide this office by July 30, 2016 the reason(s) for terminating this accessibility project at the Leon Valley Natural Area Park. Please show cost and time line in determining your decision. Individuals with disabilities may not be excluded from or denied participation in State and local government programs, services, or activities because a facility is inaccessible or unusable.

Also, explain how the City of Leon Valley will comply with Title II, regarding the issue that Leon Valley Natural Area Park trails are not accessible to individuals with disabilities.

Dear Senator Cornyn,

Thank you for your continuing efforts to expedite the complaint I originally filed with USDOJ in February 2015.

At attachment is a letter received from USDOT referencing HCR-20 and DOT#2016-0050 indicating the complaint has been referred back to DOJ.

I have been unable to contact anyone at the USDOJ Civil Rights Division at the number provided 202-307-0663.

After reading the attached correspondence, and speaking with City of Leon Valley Public Works Director Ms. Melinda Moritz, It has become evident that no one in each of the Federal Agencies through which my complaint has been routed has contacted me directly for details, nor have they offered to meet with me and other interested citizens to listen to specific details and to actually visit, and visit, the trail site. Instead they have apparently contacted the City of Leon Valley directly and have been provided misinformation.

The referenced LC-17 Project is a flood control project extending along Huebner Creek from the southern City boundary to the Bandera Rd, bridge and does not extend into the Leon Valley Natural Area Park boundary, and has absolutely no connection with the trail in question.

The referenced Hike & Bike Trail project was designed to connect a planned regional park at the southern COLV city limit, along Huebner Creek, through the LV Natural Area Park, and eventually connecting with Rimkus Park. The planned Hike & Bike Trail did not intersect the referenced trail. Our Mayor did not wish for this trail to travel through the Natural Area Park, misinforming cilizens that 450 trees would be destroyed, and the trail would be 30 ft. wide, none of which is accurate. In fact, the Mayor had attempted to completely circumvent the Natural Area Park with this proposed trail by proposing an alternate route that would have crossed Bandera Rd. at grade. The approved trail route at funding was through the Natural Area Park and met ADA requirements. The portion of the trail grant routing through the Natural Area Park was canceled at the request of the current COLV council. The Mayor has suggested (LV Lion's Roar August-September 2015) that an alternate route be chosen for the proposed Hike-Bike Trail, outside the Natural Area Park, and that the City of Leon Valley

do the actual construction "eliminating the restrictions of federal grant requirements. That would allow using existing sidewalks to be used as part of the trail".

Again, The existing LV Natural Area Trail does not meet Federal accessibility requirements (attachment). It is not related to, or associated with the proposed Hike & Bike Trail. I would very much appreciate someone meeting with me, and several other citizens, and actually louring the trail with this group of citizens. The group includes an attorney, several COLV ex council members, previous, and long time, members of the COLV Park Commission, as well as others familiar with the issue.



Dear Senator Cornyn.


I respectfully request your assistance in expediting an investigation/action by the U.S. Dept. of Justice, Civil Rights Division relative to the complaint I filed sometime back. I received a confirmation and reference number 15-9p2s9-7u73. I later contacted DOJ as a follow up, and was informed they were burdened with large numbers of complaints and it would be some time before they would contact me.

My concern is that the Issue I have described in attached correspondence has been unresolved for several years, and that too long a delay in remediating the problem will result in additional, irreparable harm.

Your assistance in expediting a review by DOJ would be greatly appreciated. There are a group of concerned citizens, of which I am a member, who have considerable documentation to support our expressed concern and facts.

The City of Leon Valley, Texas has title to a Leon Valley Natural Area Park, This park has a perimeter trail with access points providing connectivity with an adjacent Leon Valley Raymond Rimkus Park, Evening Sun, and Red Jacket Drive. For a number of years, the Natural Area Park has been leased to the Leon Valley-Historical-Society. It should be noted that the LV Historical Society leadership, and membership includes current Leon Valley Mayor Chris Riley, her husband Darby Riley (past President, current Board of Directors, past City of Leon Valley Councilman), and several current and ex Leon Valley Mayors and City Council members creating a serious conflict of interest issue. The LV Historical Society has consistently attempted to exercise complete control over the LV Natural Area Park based on it's own usage criteria.

Current Mayor Riley, and members of the Leon Valley Historical Society view the existing trail as primitive and not required to meet Faderal accessibility guideline requirements. LV Historical Society President has indicated to me, members of the Leon Valley Parks Commission, and several previous LV City Council members, that physically challenged visitors wishing to walk can visit other parks. There have been efforts to discourage visitors from entering the LV Natural Area Park including 7 signs I removed on a Easter Weekend that had a large photo of a tick with "tick warning" verblage, tree limbs arranged to create walking obstacles, and many calls to San Antonio Water System and Public Service employees/contractors working in the park along easements. I have retained copies of the tick warnings that should have fingerprints of the poster, and records of many repeated calls to authorized workers. Often threatening legal action.

Included are photographs of the existing LV Natural Area Park trail which clearly demonstrates that the trail fails to meet even minimal Federal accessibility requirements, and does not meet the requirements for the single exception listed in Federal law for a four wheel drive road accepting pedestrians.

As a Not Responsive

complained of the lack of accessibility compliance. Mayor Riley, and the LV Historical Society leadership have consistently refused to consider improvements that would meet Federal accessibility requirements. Specifically, I have asked that the trail be widened, smoothed, and an elevated pedestrian bridge be built to span a drainage channel at the NE park corner, and a culvert at the juncture of the trail at the point where the drainage channel junctures with Huebner Creek. The Mayor consistently resisted any attempt for me to apply to Texas Parks & Wildlife for Trail Grants to improve this trail. I did however, add connectivity from Rimkus Park and Evening Sun into the Natural Area Park using Texas Parks & Wildlife Grant monies (Federal funds). These extensions move a short distance into the LV Natural Area Park. The Issue is simple, provide better accessibility for family groups, children, elderly and physically challenged visitors.

In a more recent development, a trail grant was approved by the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organization-to-provide-funding for trail connectivity between a proposed regional park at the southern-boundary of Leon Valley with the City of San Antonio and the LV Raymond Rimkus Park. The grant provided for a trail along Huebner Creek, Under the Bandera Road bridge, along the perimeter of the LV Natural Area Park to Raymond Rimkus Park. Mayor Riley, and the LV Historical Society leadership attempted in a variety of ways to avoid the routing through the Natural Area Park, attempted to divert

the grant funds to road construction, and failing that succeeded in requesting MPO to postpone the grant funding until 2017, and seeking an alternate route. The project was under the control of Texas Department of Transportation, and considerable expense had been incurred in the initial engineering design. The principle objection voiced by Mayor Riley, and others, related to ADA design requirements. The project was described by this opposing group as destroying 4500 trees, 30 foot trail width, impacting 40% of the Natural Area Park, bicycle traffic, and negatively affecting wildlife. The TXDOT Project Manager, Ms Lysette Colbert, indicated to me that she had looked at the existing trail and that it did not meet even minimal Federal accessibility requirements, but had no authority to intervene.

Many citizens are unable to access, and travel the existing trail because of the obvious shortcomings. Complaints were made to TXDOT, Alamo Area MPO, and the local FHWA. I also discussed the issue with representatives of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. I was ultimately directed to DOJ as the appropriate complaint venue. The issues relating to the MPO Trail Grant are currently being reviewed and documented. It is described here to illustrate the resolve of the current Leon Valley administration, and that of the Leon Valley Historical Society leadership to avoid compliance with trail accessibility requirements. The MPO Trail Grant issue will be addressed at a later date. Again, the current complaint deals specifically with the existing LV Natural Area Park trail. At attachment are copies of several relevant documents and photographs of the existing trail.

The City of Leon Valley, Texas ("City") owns a public park that is called the LV Natural Area Park. The park has a perimeter trail with access points providing connectivity with an adjacent city park, Evening Sun Street and Red Jacket Drive. The Natural Area Park is leased to the Leon Valley Historical Society, a private nonprofil organization ("Society"). As of the date of this complaint, the original tenyear term of the lease has expired. Notwithstending the lease, the City is responsible for the park and the Society does not have legal authority to prevent

the City from exercising it's authority as the owner of the park. City elected Describe the sols of officials and the Society have altempted to identify the existing trails as primitive and therefore, not subject to Federal accessibility requirements. Likewise, City discrimination . elected officials and various Society members have indicated that physically challenged visitors wishing to walk can simply visit other parks. The City obtained a grant and engeged an engineer to design and build a hike and blko trail that would comply with Federal law, Recently, a new political majority voted to stop the project, objecting to the ADA requirements, leaving the trail inaccessible to physically handicapped visitors and in violation of federal law. Although the project is under the control of the Texas Department of Transportation, they are unable to Intervene for ADA-related reasons. Photographs of the existing trails and a copy of the City-Society lease are available.
