³⁷ BLM requested a \$4.3 million increase to their Emergency Stabilization authority level, to implement post-wildfire recovery efforts on 2015 and 2016 fires in sage steppe habitat to meet the intent of Secretarial Order 3336. The Office of Wildland Fire approved the increase in BLM authority; however, did not reduce the authority of other DOI bureaus. This increase in BLM authority did not result in DOI obligating more than its total FY 2016 Emergency Stabilization authority.
